Upcoming TameFlow Events

Campfire Talks with Herbie.

Last week the guest on the [Campfire Talk with Herbie](#) was [Richard Kasperowski](#). Richard is one of the most vocal proponents of the **Core Protocols**. The conversation with Richard touched on many aspects.

I cared about highlighting that the *Core Protocols* are an integral part of the *TameFlow Approach*. They were covered extensively in Chapter 8, *Creating a Shared Vision at the Team Level* of the ["Hyper"](#) book.

They are one of the key components that support the **Informational Flow** and the **Psychological Flow**.

A lesser known aspect is that the *Core Protocols* are also based on *Patterns*. The *Core Protocol/Patterns* are part of the broader *Pattern Language* that is at the, well, "core" of TameFlow. In short the *Core Protocols Patterns* are part of the **TameFlow Patterns**.

I highly recommend that any TameFlow practitioner become familiar with the *Core Protocols*.

Re-read Saturday with Tom Cagley

Once again, [Thomas "Tom" Cagley Jr.](#), the host of the [Software Process and Measurement Cast](#), has posted a new **Re-Read Saturday**. Tom's statement...

The hardest part for me in this chapter is the need to decouple the cost accounting mental model I have been trained (and retrained) on as a manager and business owner.

... summarized what is the biggest challenge of all for organizations that intend to adopt the *TameFlow Approach*.

While you can attain great improvements by applying the TameFlow elements that govern **Operational Flow**, no TameFlow adoption is complete without also focusing on the **Financial Flow**.

Yet transitioning from the *Cost Accounting* mindset to the *Throughput Accounting* perspective is probably THE obstacle number 1. Therefore if you want to become a successful TameFlow practitioner, learn as much as you can about **Throughput Accounting**.

Theory of Constraint

The Purpose of Data

Our [David V. Hodes](#) published another gem of a post: [Maintain True Data](#). He starts off describing an ideal scenario where data and automation are supposed to produce wonderful business outcomes – and then describes how a chain reaction of bad data and misunderstandings creates a comedy of errors. The CEO, or anybody for that matter, cannot have a *"real sense of what is going on."* Any decision is like a random throw of a dice.

David goes on highlighting the need of *"leadership around the reason why it is essential to maintain true data"*.

Ultimately any bad data in the system is attributable to a matter of

leadership. Hence the connection with the foundational pattern of **Inspired Leadership** is evident.

Bad data leads not only to opportunity costs, wasted time, missed business results, but also impacts *"engagement, motivation and a sense of accomplishment."*

But maintaining good data requires a *"high level of operating discipline."*

At the end David refers to Goldratt's *The Haystack Syndrome* book, and quotes Goldratt saying: *"Information is the answer to the question asked of the data."*

It becomes of essence to be able to ask *good questions*, but good questions without *reliable data* will give misleading answers. It all becomes a matter of having an effective and efficient **Informational Flow** in support of effective decision-making.

For this reason, I consider the creating and maintaining of good data as a fundamental element of the *TameFlow Approach*. Thanks to David for the reminding us of this!
